- * Teresa Chan, Senior Litigator for ELI, Moderator
- * Trial is focused on civil penalties; trial does not cover: criminal issues; economic claims (individual, business, government); and, natural resource damage (NRDA)
- * Judge Barbier stated on Sep 4, 2014 that BP acted with "profit-driven decisions" that amounted to "gross negligence and willful misconduct"
- * Transocean settlement already has \$800M in motion (80% of \$1B settlement)





- * Jennifer Larino, Business Reporter, The Times Picayune
 - Civil trial started on Dec 15, 2010; broken into 3 phases; handled under maritime law (judge only)
- Phase I: Feb 25 Apr 17, 2013
 - * Q Who is to blame and liability apportionment? A BP (67%), Transocean (30%), Halliburton (3%)
- Phase II: Sep 30 Oct 18, 2013
 - Q How many barrels were released? A Government says 4.2M barrels; BP says 2.45 M barrels; judge ruled on Jan 15, 2015 it was 3.19M barrels
- Phase III: Jan 20 Feb 2, 2015
 - * Q How much does BP owe in CWA fines? A- Government wants \$4,300/barrel; BP says max penalty should be \$3,000/barrel
- * BP says it has paid (or will pay) \$42B in penalties, payments, and fines





- Blaine LeCesne, Professor of Law, Loyola University
- * Central issue is do "multiple acts of ordinary negligence" equate to an "aggregate or cumulative act of gross negligence?"
- Not much case law supporting Barbier's statement; will be battled on appeal
- * Standard on appellate review is very high; appellate court, to overturn trial court, will have to show judge significantly departed from acceptable procedures.
- * There is a tremendous amount at stake in this final phase...not just dollars, but the standard to which all future activities will be measured (precedence)





- Edward Sherman, Tulane University Law School
- Trial will be studied by law students for decades to come; text book example of complex litigation
- BP's argument is two-fold
 - * Expended enormous amount of time and treasure to right this wrong: beaches cleaner than ever been; seafood landings are consistent with pre-spill levels; and, tourism is at an all-time high
 - Punished enough more fines than any disaster in history; intent of civil penalties is to deter BP (and others) from risky behavior – they have learned their lesson
- Government's argument to these points will be
 - Not seen a full recovery
 - Still have not quantified future risks
 - Still substantial pollutants in the environment

Application Process

- * Discussion / recommendations for remaining actions
 - Pre-application "workshop" at Mar 4th ORAC meeting
 - * Application goes live on / about Mar 9th (Part A and B)
 - Accept applications for 45 days
 - Score applications
 - Presentations for highest ranked proposals (10 min max)
 - Finalize scoring and submit draft MYIP to BCC
 - BCC approves draft MYIP; start 45-day comment period
 - BCC submits final MYIP to Treasury for approval
 - Treasury approves MYIP; successful applicants complete Part C
